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Letter from the Board of Directors

During the unprecedented global health crisis of COVID-19, the role of solid leadership has never been more critical than it has proven to be in 2020. Back in 1990, the City of Richmond faced its own crisis as it related to the delivery of emergency and non-emergency medical services. The situation was so dire that the City intervened in 1991 and it was then, by ordinance, the Richmond Ambulance Authority (RAA) was created, governed by an 11-member Board of Directors. Since RAA's inception, the Board has included volunteers from a multitude of professional backgrounds with a shared, core mission that has remained constant – supporting the RAA management team with its delivery of second-to-none prehospital patient care while maintaining economic efficiency to the Richmond community. 2020 has undoubtedly been challenging and we are proud to have "weathered the storm," with the team of professionals who make up RAA. In 2020, we were fortunate to have Secretary Carlos Hopkins join our Board. Secretary Hopkins currently serves as Virginia's Secretary of Veterans and Defense Affairs and brings a wealth of both civilian and public sector experience to our Board.

It has always been RAA's custom to remain committed to the community we serve, and 2020 was no different. RAA created and distributed promotional material to educate our patients about when to call 9-1-1, explaining why our crews would be wearing PPE during responses and the importance of answering questions truthfully when our Communications Center staff ask callers additional questions to screen calls potentially COVID-related. We joined the Central Virginia All Hazards Incident Management Team on a public awareness campaign to help promote wearing masks and practicing social distancing. We also partnered with the American Heart Association and held a virtual, hands-only CPR and AED demonstration as well as a virtual child car safety seat check in cooperation with the American Automobile Association-Mid Atlantic. We were proud to have been a part of the "Ultimate Backpack 2020 Drive," aimed at collecting school supplies and provided 15,000 PPE kits to children in the Richmond metro area. RAA remains an active member of a number of local workgroups and taskforces to help combat the heroin and prescription drug overdose crisis as well as work closely with our Operational Medical Director, Dr. Joseph Ornato, on the NIH-sponsored project for the drone delivery of the opioid analgesic, naloxone.

The extraordinary challenges of 2020 did not hinder our commitment to remain a good steward of City taxpayer money nor did it impede our obligation to the Richmond citizens and visitors. RAA recently closed out Fiscal Year 2020 with the financial stability necessary to provide the uninterrupted delivery of high quality EMS care. Moreover, the Authority just received a "clean audit," with no matters to report, issued by its outside financial audit firm, CliftonLarsonAllen (CLA), which is the same firm used by the City of Richmond

Our nation's frontline EMS providers have stepped up in heroic and unprecedented ways this year, and the Board of Directors is proud to have been a part of such a high-performing and dedicated EMS agency such as RAA. We look forward to less wearisome times in 2021 and will continue to support our team as we continue to carry out our mission together – delivering World Class EMS.

Operational Medical Director's Report



Clinical and Educational Developments

Nine paramedics were precepted successfully and cleared into field service in 2020. RAA began hosting an in house EMT-Basic course to offer entry level job opportunities with future advancement opportunities for qualified candidates. We graduated 10 students in the first class and have 10 students in the current class. COVID-19 presented challenges with how to treat patients with respiratory problems. Along with our regional EMS agency partners and the Old Dominion EMS Alliance (ODEMSA), we were able to adapt out protocols and procedures when necessary regionally, allowing us to continue safe, effective clinical care throughout the pandemic. For example, we provided our crews with additional equipment such as HEPA Filters and inhalation activated nebulizers to decrease the spread of COVID-19.

We allowed our EMT-Basic providers to provide patient care and transport of Omega response (low acuity) 911 calls after a patient was evaluated by an advanced life support (ALS) Provider, freeing up our ALS provider to respond to another patient in need of care. Our EMT-Basic providers cared for 4,945 9-1-1 call patients in 2020. Finally, the much awaited COVID-19 vaccination program is underway to further protect out healthcare team.

Innovation

One innovation stands out in 2020. We were able to have a manufacturer change the way nebulizers were built by adding in a HEPA filter to the exhalation port. This is a standard device being used across the USA. The device is O2 Guard (New CPAP with built in filters).

Safety

Our nationally-acclaimed, innovative safety program patterned after that used by commercial aviation continues to allow us provide complex patient care with a level of safety well below that of our peers. A key element of the program is a non-punitive, self-reporting process that allows employees to report a near miss or event. These reports, which include such things as driving, moving patients from residences, and medication kit discrepancies, allow us to identify <u>potential</u> safety hazards and to take corrective action.

Naloxone Drone Delivery to Opioid Overdose Bystanders Update

The Communicable Disease Center (CDC) issued a Health Alert Network advisory to medical and public health professionals on January 5, 2021¹ reporting that "drug overdose deaths have soared to the highest number ever recorded in a 12-month period. Approximately 81,230 drug overdose deaths occurred in the U.S. in the 12 months ending May 2020, with the largest spike after the COVID-19 public health emergency started, from March 2020 to May 2020. Drug overdose deaths were rising before March, but the findings suggest they accelerated during COVID-19."


Richmond Ambulance Authority in collaboration with a VCU research team led by Dr. Ornato and VirginiaUAS, the largest Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) certified commercial drone pilot training company in Virginia, are pioneering in the development of a program to deliver FDA-approved, intranasal spray naloxone antidote to bystander 9-1-1 callers at the scene of an opioid OD while our first responders and paramedics are racing to the victim. Just five drones placed throughout Richmond can deliver the antidote to the caller within 2 minutes or less. We have soon to be published data from a completed VCU simulation study showing that laypersons can fetch a drone from outside a building, return to the victim, and administer the antidote to a simulated manikin victim under RAA dispatcher direction in 2 minutes from 9-1-1 contact. Since EMS responders can't physically reach the victim until an average 8-9 minutes after dispatch, reversing the OD 5-6 minutes sooner has great potential to save more lives.

The research/development program is funded by a grant from the National Institutes of Health's National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA) and is the ONLY of its kind in the nation! In this first year of funding, VirginiaUAS instructors have trained seven of our RAA dispatchers who are now FAA-certified commercial drone pilots.

In the months ahead, we will be conducting simulated runs to determine how much time can be saved by have drones deliver naloxone spray to the bystander 9-1-1 caller with our dispatchers directing the caller to spray the antidote into the victim's nose while awaiting first responder and paramedic arrival. Preliminary analysis indicates that the reversal agent can be given to the victim with such an approach 6-8 mins faster than awaiting arrival of EMS personnel. And, as importantly, the FAA has just released new commercial drone operating rules that would permit us to conduct such operations within 15-18 months as new drone-tracking equipment is being installed in all major metropolitan areas nationally. The timing is perfect, since additional drone hardware/software development by VCU's College of Engineering and RAA simulation training will be required before a clinical trial of the program can occur. If successful, our program could potentially save thousands of lives a year if implemented nationally.

Chief Executive Officer's Report



To say 2020 has been a year like no other is quite the understatement! Our frontline, EMS providers risk their health and safety each and every day to selflessly provide essential EMS care to our community. Our administrative personnel continue to carry out the significant duties of their jobs and maintain the essential functions necessary to keep our agency running smoothly. As the Chief Executive Officer of a leading EMS agency during a global, public health crisis, I am thankful to face such a challenge with the team of professionals I have at the Richmond Ambulance Authority (RAA).

The safety and well-being of our staff remains a top priority. We continue to closely monitor and track the health of our employees with all necessary steps taken and protocols followed as we remain up to date with all CDC guidelines to keep everyone protected. COVID-19 related purchases such as additional Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), thermal scanners along with other essential testing and medical equipment were made possible, thanks to the support RAA was extended by the City of Richmond through the CARES Act funding state and local governments received as part of the federal stimulus package. In keeping with our commitment to staff safety, earlier this year, RAA purchased collision prevention technology devices (from HAAS Alert[®]) designed to complement Move Over laws by delivering real-time

digital alerts to motorists that an emergency vehicle is responding nearby or on-scene at an emergency.

The EMS industry on the whole continues to have a difficult time retaining and recruiting qualified field providers as a result of this pandemic. RAA's recent launch of its EMS Placement Program (enrollees referred to as "cadets") was an innovative approach to recruit individuals looking to start a career in EMS. Cadets may have little to no EMS experience and are provided the training and the opportunity to secure their EMT certification with RAA at no cost.

Notwithstanding the unprecedented challenges of 2020, RAA managed to shine and celebrate a few noteworthy moments this year. The Old Dominion EMS Alliance, RAA's EMS regional council within the Virginia Office of EMS, selected three of our finest to receive regional awards. We are also honored to have our long-standing Operational Medical Director added to the list of RAA winners. All four will be automatically entered for a chance to win a prestigious Governor's EMS Award! They are:

Michael Colman, Chief Operating Officer: Outstanding EMS Leadership,

Sarah McDaniel, Paramedic: Outstanding EMS Prehospital Provider,

Cory Bernardo, Logistics/Production Manager: Outstanding Contribution to EMS Health and Safety,

and

Dr. Joseph Ornato, Operational Medical Director: Physician with Outstanding Contribution to EMS

I am also proud to report RAA's EMT, April O'Quinn, served as the Grand Marshal for the 2020 Annual Dominion Energy Christmas Parade. April was one of five national winners in the "Heroes with Heart," contest run by American Girl[®], makers of the popular American Girl dolls.

We cannot say enough about how much that support meant and we are so thankful for the love shown to us and for the opportunity to serve such an amazing City.





























HISTORY

In 1990 The Richmond City Council and the city manager recognized they needed to make drastic changes to the city's EMS system in order to ensure all city residents received the best and most effective care. On March 20, 1991, the Virginia General Assembly created the Richmond Ambulance Authority (RAA) and on September 23, 1991, the City of Richmond granted the franchise to RAA to provide EMS services to the City of Richmond.

Since its inception, the goal of the Richmond Ambulance Authority (RAA) has been to provide its community with clinical excellence, while ensuring response time reliability and fiscal responsibility. Although it has the highest call volume per capita in the United States, RAA has gained a national and international reputation as a premiere, high performing EMS system. RAA is one of only 32 systems in the United States that has received accreditation from both the national Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS) and the International Academies of Emergency Dispatch (IAED). These accreditations are considered the "gold standard" for ambulance services, certifying distinction for quality patient care and ambulance operations.
